## Math 8220, Introduction to Topology 2 Spring 2015

**Prerequisites:** This course has as a prerequisite the course Math 6210, Introduction to Topology 1, or the instructor's approval.

**Text:** "A Basic Course in Algebraic Topology", W. Massey, Springer Verlag. We will cover much of Chapters VI through XIII of the textbook. The exact same material can be found in Massey's book "Singular Homology Theory", Chapters I through VIII.

Course outline: Topics to be covered come from an introduction to homology and cohomology theory. These topics include the definition of the singular homology groups of a topological space and their basic properties; ways of calculating the homology groups of a space, including the Mayer-Vietoris exact sequence; an introduction to CW complexes and their homology; homology with arbitrary coefficient groups; the homology of Cartesian product spaces, including the Künneth theorem; cohomology theory; and products involving homology and cohomology groups. If time permits we will cover more material from the textbook, depending on the interests of the students and the instructor. Other topics will be covered as time permits.

**Assessment:** Grades will be assigned based on performance in homework assignments (50%), an in-class quiz on Wednesday, Feb. 18 (20%), and a take-home final exam (30%).

**Homework:** 50% of your final grade will be come from your performance on homework, which will be assigned every three weeks or so. From time to time I will ask people to present solutions to the problems in class.
