Math 6310: Introduction to Real Analysis I Fall 2013

Prerequisites: Math 3001 and 4001 (Analysis I and Analysis II), or the equivalent

Text: Real Analysis, H.L. Royden, P.M. Fitzpatrick, Prentice Hall, 2010, 4th edition. We will cover most of Chapters 2–7, and more if time permits.

Course outline: This course is meant to familiarize the student with the analysis of functions of a single real variable, with an emphasis on Lebesgue measure and Lebesgue integration on the real line, together with their relationship to differentiation. Topics to be covered include: the historical development of the Lebesgue integral, a review of set theory, the structure of open sets and Borel sets on the real line, Lebesgue outer measure on \mathbb{R} , Lebesgue measurable subsets of \mathbb{R} , Lebesgue measurable extended real-valued functions, definition of the Lebesgue integral, convergence theorems in Lebesgue integration, functions defined by integrals and convolution, differentiation of monotone functions, functions of bounded variation, absolute continuity, review of metric space theory, L^p spaces, the Arzela-Ascoli Theorem, and if time permits, the Stone-Weierstrass Theorem.

Grading: Grades will be based on two in-class midterms (20% each), six homework assignments assigned during the course of the semester consisting mostly of problems from the text (25%), and a comprehensive final exam (35%). The last homework assignment will be a group project. You are encouraged to work together on homework, although each student must submit an individual write-up. Late homework will not be accepted.
